

50 GREATEST SONS PICKED AT HARVARD

Illustrious Dead Are Enrolled in
'Hall of Fame' for Eminence,
Influence and Attainment.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 12.—Harvard's fifty greatest graduates have been chosen by a distinguished committee of selectors for enrollment in a "Harvard Hall of Fame," compiled in connection with the university's celebration of its tercentenary.

The choices are made public in a magazine published by The Boston Herald, in observance of the occasion.
